

Anaesthesia for Neurosurgery

Background

I graduated from the Medical School at the University of Melbourne in 1993 and undertook my residency and subsequent anaesthesia training at St Vincent's Hospital, the Geelong Hospital, the Mercy Hospital for Women and the Royal Children's Hospital. From 2001 to 2004 I was an Assistant Professor in the Department of Anesthesiology at the University of California San Francisco where I gained extensive experience in anaesthesia for spinal surgery, neurosurgery and interventional neuroradiology including intraoperative testing and awake cases. I teach anaesthesia trainees in the ANZCA training program and I am involved in the assessment of the performance of foreign-trained anaesthetists seeking to practise here in Australia.

My current public appointments are at St Vincent's Hospital and the Royal Victorian Eye and Ear Hospital. I am a licensed medical practitioner in Victoria and also California. I am a fellow of the Australian and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists and a member of the Australian Society of Anaesthetists.

Fees

I calculate my fee for private cases using the Relative Value Guide adopted by Medicare and used by most compensation and insurance organizations. Patients funded by Workcover, TAC and VOCAT will have no out-of-pocket expense for their anaesthetic. Patients who are pensioners or Health Care Card holders and are insured with any major fund other than GMHBA, Latrobe and Federation Health should have no out-of-pocket expense.

Other patients may have an out-of-pocket expense associated with their anaesthetic. This is determined by the rules of the particular health fund and may range from around 25% of the total fee for Medibank Private, Australian Unity and most other funds to as much as 60% for patients insured with NIB. Patients with only Medicare cover will have an out-of-pocket expense of about 65% of the total fee.

The typical fee for anaesthesia for a simple lumbar spine procedure taking around one hour is about \$800. For a single-level spinal fusion taking two and a half hours the fee is about \$1400. For a major craniotomy for a cerebral aneurysm taking two hours the fee is about \$2000. The exact fee will depend on the duration of the procedure and the medical condition of the patient. My office will always send a written estimate of the fee before elective surgery if there will be any out-of-pocket expense. I am happy to be contacted for an estimate before surgery at any time through my office.
